December 2023

These notes are from the most recent Council Meeting held on December 13. When approved by the Council at their next monthly meeting in January the approved minutes will be posted in the Council Minutes Binder in the Conference Room. The next scheduled meeting will be held on January 10 at 7:30pm.

December meeting notes:

The Council was called to order by Stacy Link, the Council President, followed with devotions led by Pastor Halaas. Treasurer Derek Flanagan presented November's financial report which was accepted and approved. December's bills were presented and approved for payment.


Committee reports included details about Advent and Christmas worship planning, preparation for the Sunday School Christmas program, and details of the Christmas Giving Tree of which 150 tags were taken, gifts were received and given to the YWCA for distribution. Thanks to all. Discussion was held regarding a water leak in one section of the church's new roof which is past warranty. A roofing specialist has given recommendations, but any repairs will be done in the spring.

Discussion was held regarding the proposed 2024 budget. Complete salary details were added for pastors and staff. Discussion continued with the suggestion of adding additional dollars to Martin's commitment to Mission Outreach. The proposed budget with these additional changes was approved. (Please note that Martin's 2024 annual budget will be included in the 2023 Annual Report which will be available on Sunday, January 14, in preparation for the Annual Meeting on January 28, 2024.)

The exciting news of the evening was the Council approving the final payment of Martin's mortgage with Bremer Bank on December 28, 2023. The Council directed Joan Carvell to expedite the payment at Bremer. A special celebration of this accomplishment by Martin's will take place at the Annual Meeting in January.

The Nominating, Endowment, and Call Committees have been meeting. A slate of leadership is being prepared for voting at the Annual Meeting. Disbursements from Martin's Endowment Fund were approved by the Council for several organizations in our area and will be made by the end of 2023. There was an update on the work of the Call Committee. They are continuing to interview Pastoral candidates and will be giving an update to the congregation in December.

President of the Council, Stacy Link, prompted conversation regarding our future mission projects. Martin's mortgage will soon be paid in full and that begs the question of what future projects for Martin's are that might excite our energy and stewardship.





Pastors Thoughts

January 2024

The beginning of a new year brings forth a variety of emotions. On one hand we can reflect on the year past and on the other hand we think ahead of what might be. 2023 has been a busy year for me...getting settled in a new Moorhead home after moving from Spokane, taking on new responsibilities as your Interim Senior Pastor, being supportive to our family during the last days of my wife Gwen's Mom's death, the joy of celebrating with family and friends on the 50th anniversaries of our wedding and my college graduation. 2024 looks to be busy but a bit more relaxed...we are more settled in our new home and places of work and at Martin's the Holy Spirit is moving us closer to the reality of calling a new senior pastor. I sense 2024 may offer a bit more time for family, travel, and being with the Loons on Long Lost Lake!

When looking ahead I know that however we see the future, our situations in life can change in an instant. While we can think we are in charge we are not. Things happen, plans change, sometimes one's world can turn upside down. Sickness, sadness, and sudden changes can take us by surprise and overwhelm us. We can find ourselves on an unfamiliar journey that we least expected nor are prepared for the journey. Life is fragile and at any time our security and safekeeping can fall apart. These times are when we need Christ's love and hope to surround us. These are times when the church can also be there for us with their prayers and support.

In January, when the Christmas carols have ended and the festivities of the New Year are over, it is easy for us to sometimes slide into a spirit of melancholy and maybe the mid-winter blues, or even more seriously, depression. If that is the case talk with someone – a friend, a counselor, your physician, a pastor. Let your feelings out so that better mental health can be present.

We are in the season of Epiphany – a time when we are reminded that God's healing light shines upon us. During Epiphany, discover Psalms of God's love that offer reassurance. All these Psalms will be read in worship. Psalm 147 proclaims that God "heals the brokenhearted and binds up their wounds". Read Psalm 62:5-12 where it says, "Trust in God at all times, O people; pour out your heart before him; God is a refuge for us." And Psalm 139 where the Psalmist reminds us that we are uniquely made by God's hands, "you knit me together in my mother's womb ...for Lord, you have searched me and you know me." For those who read to children - read Psalm 139 and then read to your children *The Runaway Bunny by Margaret Wise Brown*. These Psalms provide us all with God's promise that nothing can separate us from God's love in Jesus.

As we begin a new season in the Church year and a New Year in our lives, may the love and light of Christ be in our hearts and shine out to others!



through Acts in January. You can find more information on the synod website: https://www.eandsynod.org/



Communion Diagram

We have begun a new pattern for Communion ushering starting with the outside sections of pews (Section 1 & 4) and directing people from the front toward the back to go around to receive communion in the center aisle. Then when those sections have received communion the ushers move to the middle pews (Section 2 & 3) and direct people toward the front by starting with the back rows. Hopefully this diagram helps visualize this. For Communion at the rail the same pattern is used with the difference being you can fill in at the rail from the center out to the sides. When we do 4 stations for Communion we'll keep much of the same pattern and have Sections 1 & 4 Commune in the back of their Section and return to their place by the side aisle by the wall.

After many phone calls to update our membership information, we have started a new process for our monthly service groups. In the past a member of your group called you to either serve at fellowship hour or bring cookies and if they filled the needs, you were not called. This process left many members not having a way to serve the church and many felt as if they were never called. Now the service groups will be in charge of filling the many areas that are needed EVERY week at Martins.

It takes between 20-25 people most Sundays, not counting musicians, pastors, offering counters, and sound people, to make each service run smoothly.

We are also adding a Service group "Fellowship Social" the month before your actual service month so each member can meet their group members, put a name to a face, and initial signups can be done. During this time, we will run through what is expected for each job and questions can be answered at that time. After that meeting those who were not able to attend will be called to fill in empty areas. The group, the service coordinator and I will meet after church on the FIRST SUNDAY of the month. We hope this process will help eliminate the lastminute weekly needs of the church. Together we can make Martins a strong, faithful, serving community. Erin Baumgarten


